HISTORY CORNER

A Bible lesson for today. Ecclesiastes might represent a diary of Solomon's life. The Lord appeared to him twice and gave him wisdom, wealth, and power. He built the most magnificent temple ever constructed and his renown was known throughout the realm. But, he was turned aside to idolatry by the love of his many foreign wives. His wisdom, wealth, and power became disconnected from the Giver of life and truth. Therefore, the Lord raised up adversaries, split the kingdom from his son, and Solomon writes the results in his own dissatisfaction in his diary. He became a testimony of G.K. Chesterton's quip, "Do not be so liberal minded that your brain falls out." God's grace allowed him to return to the fear of the Lord as written in chapter 12. The story is a caution to us in America that the major problems of our time are not political or economic or the pandemic, but rather the wide acceptance of sexual immorality, desecration of God's design for marriage, and allowance for the killing of the unwanted before birth. We should be praying about restoring the spiritual foundation of America more than what appears before our eyes.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING SUNDAY, MARCH 6 | 9:00 A.M. | ROOM 112



FAMILY OF THE MONTH: CARROLL

On February 1, 2022, Ruth Carroll took her last breath on this earth. She has been a member of Mellwood/North Park Church for close to 72 years. I knew her as a role model and inspiration for the last 42 years of her life and recently learned some interesting facts about the first 53 years of her life from her son Jack.

Ruth was the oldest child of John and Nancy Clarke who raised Ruth in the Presbyterian traditions they learned from Ireland. She skipped two years and still graduated as valedictorian of her class at Carrick High School and earned a scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh. Between high school and college, she worked for the U.S. Weather Service, helping to compile statistics that would help to determine the D-Day launch of World War II. This accomplished red head with the nickname "Rusty" found her true love, Robert Carroll, who was in medical school at Pitt. She married this devout Catholic in 1948 who

shared her passion for helping and serving others and they had 8 children in 12 years.

Their first home together and Bob's medical practice was in the McKnight Road area. Early in his practice Dr. Robert Carroll decided he would provide his services free of charge to those in Christian ministry who were in need. One-day Bob told Ruth about a nice new patient, Dr. Baldinger, the pastor at Mellwood on Babcock Blvd. and suggested she check out his church. Ruth found a home and never left.

Ruth joined the church one year before I was born in 1950. I met Ruth and Bob in 1979 when I started attending Mellwood on Browns Lane. We had an early special connection because twice a

year (Christmas and Easter) we would see each other twice on those Sunday mornings. Her husband Bob and my wife Linda were both members of St. Sebastian. It was easy to find them because Bob had a distinctive friendly, joyful, and loud laugh. The four of us also shared a calling to save the lives of the unborn who were vulnerable to possible abortion. Our paths would cross at many events and through service in prolife organizations. Ruth served with me in a "Salt and Light" group at NPC that took a bus to the March for Life in D.C., erected 3,000 crosses on the front lawn of NPC, wrote a monthly article in the church newspaper and even ran a Sunday School class dealing with social issues that drew 50-100 people in the Blue Room for topics like outcome-based education, homosexuality, pornography, gambling, and of course, abortion. Ruth was proper, polite, and dignified but she didn't hide her feelings or compromise her convictions.

When her youngest child started first grade, Ruth started back to school and in 1967 earned her Master of Library Science and worked for both Carlow and Duquesne Universities. She was a Ross Township Commissioner. In her years at NPC she served as Financial Secretary, chaired the Administration and Personnel Committee, sang in the choir, played in the Bell Choir and fittingly was a member of the Long-Range Planning Committee. When we had two services (traditional and contemporary) she always attended the first service, preferring the hymns. Ruth and Bob moved into Vincention Villa in 2010 when Bob knew he had an incurable cancer so that Ruth would be well cared for in a home that included all maintenance. In 2011 Bob died peacefully after 62 years of marriage. At this point Ruth had begun the slow change from being someone who spent her life caring and helping others to becoming someone who had to learn how to receive and accept help. She became part of a group of recently widowed women at NPC that would go out for lunch after church once

> a month and have fun and support each other. Annetta Lang, Thelma Gross, Geil Williams, Marge Stauffer, Lorraine Lippert, Helen Menhorn and Jane Moore were an unofficial care group.

> In Ruth's last decade her arthritis and aches and pains increased, her memory got slowly worse, and she suffered a series of strokes. She moved from Vincentian Villa to Vincentian nursing and rehab, back to the Villa, then to a short stay at Atrias, then Passavant Hospital and finally to Caring Heights in Coraopolis. She had the love and support of her children, 17 grandchildren, and 14 greatgrandchildren. Her son Jack would visit every day he was permitted at Caring

Heights but COVID regulations and isolation were hard on Ruth. Frequently no visitors were allowed and most of Ruth's meals were brought to her room, so she never got to go to a dining room and share time with other residents.

Sometimes we wonder why God allows people to die before we think it is their time and sometimes we wonder why God doesn't grant someone the freedom to be with their loved ones that preceded them to eternity sooner. She outlived her husband, one daughter and one grandson. Ruth modelled for me how to love and give as much as possible for as long as possible and then how to accept dependency and receive it graciously. I am confident that she has now seen God in all His glory and heard Bob's distinctive friendly, joyful and loud laugh and embraced him once again in their restored eternal bodies. I want to **BLESS** my neighbors, but I'm so busy that I find it overwhelming when I consider adding another task to my to-do list. Do you have any advice for me? — **TOO BUSY TO BLESS**

DEAR TOO BUSY TO BLESS,

I have definitely been in that place where life feels like a whirlwind and my mind is racing on to the next thing. I would encourage you to think of **PBJ** more as how you will do all the things that need done and less about adding another thing to that overflowing list. How can you be blessing others in the course of your daily routines?

We all have to go to the grocery store, for instance. When you are checking out and hear the exasperation in the cashier's voice, can you pause for just a minute to ask what else is going on? Or, maybe you are rushing here and there to make it to your children's sporting events. Maybe you notice that your child's teammate had an excellent game. Why not share that with them as an affirming word when you leave? Acts of blessing can be small. They just need to be intentional.

In the end, instead of thinking of **PBJ** as one more thing to add to your life, think of it as something that shapes what you are already doing. — **PETER PAN**

DEAR TOO BUSY TO BLESS,

So many of us are nodding in agreement with you and experiencing that same overwhelmedness, and maybe even some guilt, as we read your question and feel our own inadequacy to do-it-all. I know that I am.

First, praise God that He does not ask us to do-it-all. That is why we start with PRAYER. Ask God,

- "What are You calling me to do?"
- "What am I doing that You are NOT calling me to do?"
- "Are there any places in my life where I am wasting my time?"

Second, consider how God has created and gifted you. Is there something that you LOVE to do, that fills and restores you when you do it? Could you utilize that in some way to **BLESS** those around you?

Maybe you don't have to add to your to-do list, but rather could utilize what you are already doing to be a blessing. Going to the store? Text a neighbor to see if they need anything. They will likely say no, but will feel blessed to know that they were thought of. **— CHOOSY MOM**

HOW WILL YOU BLESS THIS MARCH?

- Tell someone something you appreciate about them
- Text a Bible verse to someone who is hurting
- Invite a neighbor for a game night
- Leave positive feedback on a survey
- Deliver some spring flowers to a neighbor
- Share a link to a sermon with someone you think it would bless
- Give someone a box of chocolates
- Tape a bag of microwave popcorn with a Bible verse to a Redbox machine

- Offer to take a neighbor out to breakfast
- Leave positive messages (Bible verses) on post it notes around a grocery store
- Offer to babysit for someone to go on a date
- Sign up to be a part of NPC's meal ministry
- While out, give someone a genuine compliment
- Invite a friend to Bible study with you
- Pick up a little treat to gift to a neighbor or co-worker chocolate bar, box of tea, etc.

Remember to pray before, during, and after you **BLESS**. "May the favor of the Lord our God be upon us, and establish the work of our hands!" *Psalm 90:17* because "Unless the LORD builds the house, those who build it labor in vain." *Psalm 127:1* Want a tangible reminder to **BLESS**? SPRING 2022 ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

GOOD SENSE PARENTING BRUCE ALLISON

This class will focus on helping parents to better fulfill their role as parents as God has intended. Understanding that we are to model God's love for His children, we will discuss various issues that influence our parenting and simple ways to be more intentional in nurturing our children. We will discover how to show true unconditional love to our children by embracing God's model for us - Love and acceptance on one hand, balanced by rules and limits on the other.
